The directors present their Directors' Annual Report, combining the Directors' Report and Trustees' Report, and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2016.

The company is a registered charity and hence the report and results are presented in a form which complies with the requirements of the Companies Act 2014 and, although not obliged to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice (Charities SORP effective January 2015), the organisation has implemented its recommendations where relevant in these financial statements.

The directors, who are also the trustees of the charity, at the date of this report and those who served during the financial year together with the dates of any changes are set out on page 3.

Principal Activities

The principal activity is the promotion of arts, culture and heritage.

The company is limited by guarantee not having a share capital.

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The operation and management of an arts centre involves the taking of risks particularly around the programming of performance. This is the essence of the activity, and as such risk is a constant consideration of the company. All risks are accessed and quarterly reviews of financial performance ensure decisions are as prudent as possible.

Objectives and Activities

The object of the charity is to advance the education and delivery of the arts for the benefit of the community and surrounding regions by operating and managing the Courthouse Arts Centre as a venue to promote the development, understanding and participation of exciting, challenging and relevant arts events.

The charity has the general aim to to provide comprehensive artistic and outreach programmes in an atmospheric and intimate space, hosting a wide variety of multi-disciplinary arts events and workshops. Our programme includes: Theatre, Dance, Music, Film, Visual Arts, Comedy, Literature and an Education/Outreach programme. We are committed to offering emerging artists a platform to showcase their work.

Vision

"We pride ourselves on providing a vibrant and dynamic programme showcasing national and international performers and artists. We actively promote both emerging artists and community arts practitioners."

Mission Statement

The Courthouse provides an intimate and dynamic creative environment that inspires and engages artists, nurtures a diverse audience and enriches the rural town of Tinahely and its surrounding region.

Achievements and Performance

In 2013 the Courthouse Arts Centre went to a part-time venue model to maintain financial sustainability. This decision allowed for essential upgrades to be made in staging, reception and sound production between 2014-2016. By the end of 2017 the director's will be looking to re-instate the full time model again.

Attendance

In 2016 approx 13,000 members of the public visited and or experienced a Courthouse Arts centre event.

Financial Review

A number of special events were held in 2016 to mark both the twenty year celebration of the venue and 1916 commemoration events and as such put a financial burden on the expected profit of the company. Although 2015 saw a profit of €2,743 which was taken into reserves, the reduced profit in 2016 was expected.

Investment Powers and Policy

In accordance with the company constitution the company has the power to invest in any way the directors wish.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the Courthouse Arts Centre to expend at the discretion of the Artistic Director and the Board of directors any income as yet not spent at year end for the furtherance of the charity's objectives. These reserves include: working capital, shortfalls in income, unexpended expenditure and programme reserves.

Auditors

The auditors, Sean Brennan & Co Accountants Limited, have indicated their willingness to continue in office in accordance with the provisions of Section 380 of the Companies Act, 2014.

Special Events held in 2016

In 2016 The Courthouse Arts Centre was open twenty years as an independent arts venue.

The Courthouse also undertook a number of 1916 commemorative events to mark the 1916 rising.

Literary weekend During the Month of March a Literary weekend was held to commemorate 1916 through ballad, story and verse. An established pattern of an open panel discussion took place with a musical influence on the Saturday and a visual art influence on the Sunday.

Each member of the panel had a sophisticate relation to the politics of 1916 and its aftermath.

The weekend also supported our local writers group with a Saturday morning reading from 6 members. Saturday evening a theatre performance was held: Rebel Rebel directed by Anu's Louise Lowe and starting Aisling O Mara and Robble O Connor.

The aim during this panel discussion was to go beyond the literary aspect of 1916 and explore through a visual dimension the Easter Rising, and as a prominent theme of this exploration, examine the actual commemoration of this singular event in Irish history.

Irish Chamber Orchestra Off-site at Nun's Cross Church

In collaboration with Mermaid Arts Centre we presented The Magic of the Movies at the beautiful Nun's Cross Church in Ashford Co Wicklow. This off-site performance draw audience members from across the county and brought together both arts centre in a rich a rewarding working experience.

Heritage lecture

The life and times of Lillie (Reynolds) Connolly by Theresa Moriarty.

The life of Lillie Reynolds has been obscured by the powerful figure of James Connolly, whom she married in 1890 and who was executed in May 1916. The lecture traced Lillie Reynolds from her origins in the Wicklow countryside, against the background of her times, and brought into focus her loyalties and commitments, both public and private. Theresa Moriarty is an independent researcher, with a particular interest in the history of women workers of the early twentieth century.

Culture Night

This year the Courthouse Arts Centre took our main event off-site to Shelton Abbey open prison. An afternoon of drumming workshops in the garden for the prisoners was followed by a theatre performance of Give us a go of your bongo's mister! By Brian Fleming, A richly rewarding experience for both the Courthouse and the prisoners. More outreach work at Shelton Abbey is palaned for 2017.

On-site for our regular audience members we had a late opening time of our Emerging artists exhibition 2016. 7pm-9pm with facilitated art workshops for young and old.

Memories and Music Café

In 1986 renovations began on the Courthouse opening a new chapter in the life of this remarkable building. By 1996 the Courthouse opened its doors as Wicklow's first independent arts centre. Twenty years on the Courthouse Arts Centre plays a vital role in the artistic and entertainment life of the locality. This celebratory café paid tribute to all those who were involved in the restoration project through FAS apprenticeship, board members and staff past and present.

To celebrate twenty years of bringing high quality arts to the community of Tinahely the Courtnouse Arts Centre held a free open air theatrical Mad Hatters Tea Party in its front garden. Garden games and art and craft activities were offered alongside tea and cake. Storytellers and stilt walkers entertained and young and old got to meet Alice, the Mad Hatter, Tweedle Dum and Tweedle Dee, the March Hare and the White Rabbit.

2016 Emerging artists Exhibition

51 graduate artists exhibited works in 2d: contemporary fine art, print, photography and 3d: ceramics, glass, textiles, sculpture, production design and model making. The exhibition was opened by Dr Eimear O Connor art curator, lecturer, art advisor and archivist.

Visual Arts

January Youth Arts. Is this art? Or can I throw it out? Vibrant art exhibition from over 250 young Wicklow artists both primary and secondary level with a focus on how art is made, what art is made from and how we view art as an object.

February Catherine Ryan. Coastlines. The paintings were made in response to a number of visits to various coastat regions throughout treland during the course of 2015. They did not represent any one given location - rather they represented a synthesis of times, places and events which sought to evoke the totality of the coastal experience. They were based on a series of on-site sketches which were viewed as a unified whole and were then deconstructed and re-imagined by the selective edit of memory.

March Rod Coyne. Centenary Portraits Collection. This exhibition was an exclusive series of portraits remembering the faces of Easter 1916. The artist blended contemporary and classical painting to draw together the vasily diverse photographic sources. The unity of style he achieved underlined the diverse nature of the Risings' protagonists and how they bound together in common purpose.

April Trudi Doyle. Imagine. Artist Trudi Doyle returned to show her paintings at the Courthouse for the third time. Trudi was the first artist to show in the Courthouse when it opened in 1996. This was an opportunity to view her original, intriguing and beautiful paintings. Trudi's art has a distinct style and quality: imagination is the primary source for her work, many images are offered to the viewer to interpret as they may.

May Dave Hingerty. Where Is My Mind? The title and theme of a photo exhibition by Dave Hingerty of musicians and tour locations. The photographs represent the theme of duality which we all know, whereby people are engaged on one level with the world around them, but are often in a very different place in their mind. It is also the title of the famous Pixies song which Dave and The Frames band members performed onstage with Frank Black, the Pixies singer. These are tour photographs with a unique viewpoint; on stage, behind the scenes, in the dressing room, on the tour bus. Immersed in the music, Dave's work is very much Access-All-Areas photography. An internationally renowned Rock and Roll drummer, percussionist, and master instructor; Dave has played with household names such as The Frames, Josh Ritter and Paul Brady. He was awarded the prestigious 0-1 award by the US government as an alien of extraordinary ability in the arts. A percentage of profits from sales of prints go to Alzheimer's Society of Ireland.

July Jane Jermyn. Clay Journeys Pots and Snapshots. An exhibition of ceramics and photographs. The exhibition was part of the 20th Anniversary celebrations of the Courthouse Arts Centre it was also the 20th Anniversary of the first time Jane Jermyn exhibited her ceramics, as part of Grennan Mill Craft School End of Year exhibition. Before becoming a student in Grennan Mill the previous year, Jane had been the secretary of the Courthouse Restoration Committee for many years and was one of those instrumental in saving, what has become an important part of the cultural life of Tinahely and South Wicklow. Jane travels widely in connection with her ceramic practice and takes many snapshots of people and places that interest her. This exhibition celebrates some of those journeys taken.

August A Celebration of Irish Wool. A group exhibition with workshops celebrating the diverse ways wool can be used in both art and craft.

September Emerging artists 2016. 51 graduate artists from 8 colleges: DIT Dublin, IADT Dun Laoghaire, NCAD Dublin, LSAD Limerick, CIT Cork, Burren College of Art, Grennan Mill Thomastown, Gorey School of Art.

October Terry Corcoran and Sharon Bangert. Water/Fall. In 2014, poet and translator of Isabelie Eberhardt, Sharon Bangert; and artist Terry Corcoran decided, before it was too late, to work together on a common theme combining his paintings with Sharon's poetry. Titled "Water/Fall", these paired works explore flow and transformation in watercolor and words. In response to the question, whether the paintings or the poems came first, in fact Terry and Sharon worked quite separately, only pairing

the paintings and poems when they had the number they had decided on for the exhibition that resulted.

Music

January - Youth arts Festival, 50 + young musicians, poets, performers took part in our two Youth Cafe's celebrating youth music, dance, theatre, spoken word/poetry.

February Our Positive Parenting Concert. Pilgrim Street brought blues and old time country/folk to a new generation. This concert series is to help cut the costs of entertainment by inviting parents to bring their 8-12 year olds for free, thus cutting the costs of babysitting, also helping parents get out as a couple and experience live music with their children.

March - . Paddy Casey played the Courthouse for the first time in March and now holds the record for the longest concert not leaving the stage until 12:30am!

May Our birthday concert saw The Hot House Flowers rock the walls of the Courthouse with their energy and repertoire. Le Vent du Nord folk dynamos - on tour with Music Network equally brought the audience to new heights, all be it in French tones! Our audience was spirited away with the Irish Chamber Orchestra and Dermot Dunne in a rare treat of The Magic of the Movies off-site at Nun's Cross Church Ashford.

June Kila returned to the Courthouse in June to play a summer concert and bring their remarkable style of music to our intimate venue. This concert coincided with the Dave Hingerty exhibition so we had Dave's work on the walls and his musical talents on drums - much to the delighted of a sold out audience.

Emphasis of Matter - Going Concern

In forming our opinion, which is not qualified, we have considered the adequacy of the disclosures made in Note 2 to the financial statements concerning the company's ability to continue as a going concern. The continued existence of the company is dependant on receipt of non-repayable grant aid from the Arts Council and Wicklow County Council. These conditions indicate the existence of material uncertainties which may cast significant doubt about the company's ability to continue as a going concern. In view of the significance of the fact that the preparation of the financial statements on a going concern basis assumes the continued receipt of grant support, we consider that these disclosures should be brought to your attention.

Matters on which we are required to report by exception

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

for the year ended 31 December 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (Charities SORP in accordance with FRS 102, effective January 2015) and with generally accepted accounting principles in Ireland and Irish statute comprising the Companies Act 2014. They comply with the financial reporting standards of the Accounting Standards Board, as promulgated by Chartered Accountants Ireland. The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charitable company's financial statements.

Incoming Resources

Voluntary income or capital is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the company is legally entitled to it, its financial value can be quantified with reasonable certainty and there is reasonable certainty of its ultimate receipt. Entitlement to legacies is considered established when the company has been notified of a distribution to be made by the executors. Income received in advance of due performance under a contract is accounted for as deferred income until earned. Grants for activities are recognised as income when the related conditions for legal entitlement have been met. All other income is accounted for on an accruals basis.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Land and buildings freehold Fixtures, fittings and equipment 4% Straight line15% Straight line

Taxation

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date where transactions or events have occurred at that date that will result in an obligation to pay more tax in the future, or a right to pay less tax in the future. Timing differences are temporary differences between the company's taxable income and its results as stated in the financial statements.

Deferred tax is measured on an undiscounted basis at the tax rates that are anticipated to apply in the periods in which the timing differences are expected to reverse, based on tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

2. GOING CONCERN

The continued existence of the company is dependent on the continued receipt of non repayable grants from the Arts Council and Wicklow County Council. The directors have concluded that these circumstances represent the existence of material uncertainties which may cast doubt upon the company's ability to continue as a going concern and therefore it may be unable to realise its assets and discharge its liabilities in the normal course of business. However, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the company will continue to receive an adequate level of financial support from the Arts Council and Wicklow County Council to allow the company to continue in the future. If for any reason funding was to decrease, the directors would reduce project costs in line with any funding decreases. For these reasons, they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the annual financial statements.
